## From Our Pastor

Dear Friends,
Today is World Marriage Day, an annual observance to honor husband and wife as the foundation of the family, the basic unit of society. It salutes the beauty of their faithfulness, sacrifice and joy in daily married life. I invite every husband and wife to
 spend a little dedicated time in prayer and reflection by participating in a seven-day virtual retreat focused on marriage (www.foryourmarriage.org). See page 8 in this bulletin for more details about opportunities for marriage enrichment, divorce survival, and retreat.

We all know that marriage is NOT a bed of roses. Every marriage hits its rough spots. Pope Francis noted in his apostolic exhortation Amoris Laetitia that "the life of every family is marked by all kinds of crises. Couples should be helped to realize that surmounting a crisis need not weaken their relationship... Each crisis becomes an apprenticeship in growing closer together or learning a little more about what it means to be married. There is no need for couples to resign themselves to an inevitable downward spiral or a tolerable mediocrity" (no. 232). If you are struggling in your marriage, take heart! The Church cares about you and wants you and your spouse to find healing and a renewed sense of love. Be open to the resources our Church offers to enrich and support your married life.

At the same time, we need to be aware of those couples who have found it impossible to stay in marriage due to insurmountable difficulties and so have chosen to separate or divorce. All of us need to be sensitive to their situation as St. John Paul II beautifully asked us: "I earnestly call upon pastors and the whole community of the faithful to help the divorced and with solicitous care, to make sure that they do not consider themselves as separated from the Church... Let the Church pray for them, encourage them and show herself a merciful mother and thus sustain them in faith and hope."

In this context, it is important to have a clear picture of their status in the eyes of the Church as there are many misconceptions: Catholics who are separated or divorced, and who have not remarried outside of the church, are in good standing in the church and can receive the sacraments, including holy Communion. That means divorced/separated Catholics are not excommunicated from the church as some mistakenly think. Annulments do not cost thousands of dollars. Annulments do not take years to process and do not have to be processed in Rome. Divorcees with children can get an annulment. Even if your "ex" does not cooperate in the annulment process, you can still get help. Separated/divorced Catholics are welcome at Mass and Church activities. Separated/divorced Catholics can receive the sacraments of Eucharist and Reconciliation - provided their remarriage, if any, is in the church. They can be sponsors at Baptism and Confirmation. The children of the separated/divorced Catholics can be baptized and receive other sacraments.

Knowing that we are all God's children trying to live life to the best of our ability will give us a greater understanding of the struggles we all face, especially those with difficulties in marriage; it will then give us a greater appreciation of each other.

"You shall not commit adultery" might be interpreted as "Show your spouse that they come first and you love him/her wholeheartedly." Go the extra mile for your beloved today. Find a way to stretch your love.

## Anger is an Unexploded Bomb!

Christopher Burns wrote an article, "Wars' Lethal Leftovers Threaten Europeans," in 1994 on the casualties of war, not the most current one with its Improvised Explosive Devices but of wars that officially ended seventy years ago in the case of World War II and ninety-seven years ago as regards World War I. How is that? "The bombs of World War II are still killing in Europe. They turn up, and sometimes blow up, at construction sites, in fishing nets, or on beaches decades after the guns fell silent. Hundreds of tons of explosives are recovered every year in France alone. Thirteen old bombs exploded in France in 2009, killing twelve people and wounding eleven, the Interior Ministry said. 'I've lost two of my colleagues,' said Yvon Bouvet, who heads a government team in the Cham-pagne-Ardennes region that defuses explosives from both World War I and World War II.... 'Unexploded bombs become more dangerous with time,' Bouvet said. 'With corrosion inside, the weapon becomes more unstable, the detonator can be exposed.'"
What is true of buried bombs is true of lingering anger. It explodes when we least expect it. That is why Jesus advises us to manage our anger in the Sermon on the Mount.

## Passion and Reason

The Greek philosopher, Plato, four hundred years before Christ, wrote of two horses in the human heart, Passion and Reason. Passion is the wild untamed horse
 with boundless strength and energy, but very hard to control and direct. Reason is the tamed horse, accustomed to the reins, disciplined in stride and responding to directions. A chariot hitched to a pair of Passions might go anywhere but would surely crash or overturn before long. However, a charioteer who selects a pair of Reasons will be too cautious and fearful to go anywhere worthwhile. But if Passion and Reason can be paired, then the powerful energy is harnessed and the journey of life can be enjoyed.

- The teaching of Jesus strongly affirms the need of rules, but rules are to be understood as a means to the end, which is a life of spiritual strength and commitment.


## Repair work

". . . if you bring your gift to the altar, and there recall that your brother has anything against you, leave your gift at the altar, go first and be reconciled with your brother and then come and offer your gift."
Matthew 5: 17-37

In the January 2023 issue of America Magazine, essayist and dad Joe Pagetta recounts a confrontation with his six-year-old daughter. With another daughter sick in her room with COVID, Dad asked the healthy daughter to put on mask for the sake of the other members of the household, including her 78-year-old grandmother. Dad couldn't find the mask she liked and she refused to wear the one Dad gave er. Standoff. Dad lost it, grabbed her by both arms, stiffly and screamed "Put on the friggin' mask!" (Dad didn't say "friggin"). Dad then went into another room to calm down and gather himself.

Not long after, his daughter came in to apologize. Dad fell to his knees and hugged her. He was the one who was sorry for losing his cool and yelling, he assured her, sorry for not being more patient, sorry for taking his stress out on her. Pagetta shared the incident with Dr. Kathleen Seabolt, executive director of the Child and Family Center at Vanderbilt University. Dr. Seabolt responded, "You were rightly protecting a home from disease, a disease that has killed over three million Americans. You are allowed to make an effort to protect your family. It's our job as parents." But she also said that Dad was right to make amends: "The repair could be, 'I know we are both angry right now and I regret the tone of my voice. I regret the words I've chosen. I wish I had made better choices. And it's very important that we all cooperate together to keep Grandma well, to keep everybody healthy.""

Pagetta was struck by Dr. Seabolt's use of the word "repair" as a key part of reconciliation. He writes: "If you ask for forgiveness from your daughters (or anyone else) and call upon God's grace and receive it (and from God, I believe, you always do), you must then decide to take action. To be more patient. To attempt to fix what has been broken." Dr. Seabolt adds: "If we are trapped in a cycle of 'l'm sorry,' those words lose power because there's no repair attached to the words. If a child chooses to parrot language of apology without the proper feelings and process, then we have taught them a magic spell to make bad feelings go away and for them to be able to go on about their business. That is not the process we want."

In today's Gospel, Jesus calls all of us who would follow him to be actively engaged in the "repair" work of reconciliation: mending frayed relationships, healing broken friendships, restoring peace to fractured families and communities. Such "repairs" requires humility, generosity of spirit and grace grace that stressed-out dad Joe Pagetta came to realize is readily available from the God of reconciliation. In every relationship, in every set of circumstances, the faithful disciple of Jesus seeks to break the destructive rut of distrust and resentment by taking that formidable first step to "repair" the love and trust that has been broken between us and those we love.

## Love in all its beauty and pain

In a European village many years ago, a young man was courting the daughter of a rabbi.
"I love you," the young man proclaimed. "Do you?" the woman asked. "I love you deeply," he insisted. She paused for a moment. "Do you know what gives me pain, what hurts me, what makes me sad?" she asked. He was taken aback by her question. He stammered that he did not and could not possibly know what hurt her. "I am trying to tell you how much you mean to me and you ask meaningless questions!" "The question is not meaningless," she said quietly but firmly. "For if you do not know what hurts me, how can you possibly say you love me?"

We have been created in the image and likeness of the God who created us as an expression of his complete, unconditional love. Our reason for being is to manifest that love in the world God created. To follow Jesus is to be ministers of such love, to be agents of reconciliation, to be the means for God's love to be realized. Such love begins in our service to others, in lifting up their hopes and dreams as we work to realize our own, to find our happiness in the happiness of others. Christ's teachings on reconciliation and forgiveness challenge us to embrace an attitude of compassion that understands and acknowledges the hurt and pain that exists in the lives of everyone of us. Only in understanding the despair and disappointments of those we love - and of those we find difficult to love - can we begin to break the cycle of hatred, fear and vengeance that entraps us and plunges our world into war and violence.


## Anger destroyed his life

 Two great men were born in the year 1564 A.D. One man- Shakespeare lived to the age of fifty-two and became the greatest dramatist of the English language. The other- Christopher Marlow perished midway in his life at the age of twenty-nine, because of his anger. Christopher wrote some of the best tragic plays at a very young age. One of his best plays is "The tragical life of Dr. Faustus." Had he lived longer he probably would have become greater than Shakespeare. He was a man given to anger. He picked up a quarrel with a man in a tavern. That man challenged him to a sword fight unto death. They both fought and Christopher was mortally wounded and later succumbed to his injuries. A great promise was terminated be-
 cause of anger

Jesus explains that the fifth commandment means respecting life in all its stages by honoring others in words and deeds. This means that we have to control our anger because it is the rawest, strongest and most destructive of human emotions. Describing three stages of anger and the punishment each deserves, Jesus advises his disciples not to get angry in such a way that they sin.

1) Anger in the heart ("brief stage of insanity" Cicero), has two forms: a) a sudden, blazing flame of anger which dies suddenly. b) a surge of anger which boils inside and lingers so that the heart seeks revenge and refuses to forgive or forget. Jesus prescribes trial and sentencing by the Village Court of Elders. 2) Anger in speech: Using words which are insulting ("raka"="fool"), or damaging to the reputation ("moros" meaning a person of loose morals). Jesus says that such an angry one should be sent to the Sanhedrin or Jewish religion's Supreme Court for trial and sentencing. 3) Anger in action: Sudden outbursts of uncontrollable anger often result in physical assault or abuse. Jesus says that such anger deserves hellfire as its punishment. In short, Jesus teaches that long-lasting anger is bad, contemptuous speech or destroying someone's reputation is worse and harming another physically is the worst.

## Be Men and Women of integrity and Character

According to the teachings of the Jewish rabbis, the world stands fast on truth, justice and peace; hence, liars, slanderers, scoffers and hypocrites will not enter Heaven. The rabbis classified two types of oaths as offensive to God:

1) frivolous oaths using God's name to support a false statement because this violates the second commandment and
2) evasive oaths using words like Heaven, Jerusalem, or my head because God is everywhere, and He owns everything. Jesus interprets the Mosaic Law on oaths to mean that we should be righteous men and women of integrity and character. If one is honest in his or her words and deeds, there is no need for one to support his or her statements and transactions with oaths or swearing. How forceful are honest words! (Job 0:69). An oath is a solemn invocation of God (So help me, God!) to bear witness to the truth of what one asserts to be the case or to the sincerity of one's undertakings in regard to future actions. It is necessary and admissible to ask God's help in the discharge of an important social duty (e.g., President's oath of office), or while bearing witness in a court of law ("I will tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth ... "So help me, God."). Jesus teaches, "Say yes when you mean yes and say no when you mean no" (Mt 5:37). That is, he invites us to live in truth in every instance and to conform our thinking, our words and our deeds to the truth.

## Never curse the Umpire!

Angelo Bartlett Giamatti was the President of Yale University, and later, the seventh Commissioner of Major League Baseball. Giamatti loved baseball. He felt that the structure of the game was a paradigm of the human journey in which all of us seek to break from the box, make a wide turn and get home safely. At his memorial service, Giamatti's son recalled endless hours in which his father (clad in a vest, a tie and a Red Sox cap) pitched them in to him. His son also recalled a word of advice, forcefully delivered after a Little League argument at first base (with father admonishing son): "Never curse the umpire. He's the only one who knows the rules." It was Giamatti's contention, you see, that the beauty of the game ... indeed, the very ballet of the game ... required someone who could define the difference between ball and strike, fair and foul, safe and out, and who could also articulate the rules that give the game its structure. For the rules are to baseball as the law is to life. They are not the game. But without them, the game has no meaning. Or, as a character exclaims in Woody Allen's excellent film Crimes and Misdemeanors: ®Without the law, all is darkness. ${ }^{\circledR}$ In today’s Gospel, Jesus reinterprets the Mosaic laws giving them a new meaning.

## CELEBRATING THE MEMORY OF MR. JOHN ROBERT LEWIS

There are many notable people to celebrate in Black History Month but today we remember. John Robert Lewis was a civil rights activist who served as a United States Congressman representing Georgia's 5th district from 1987 until his death in 2020. He was born on February 21, 1940. Mr. Lewis was a son of sharecroppers and an apostle of nonviolence who was bloodied at Selma's Edmund Pettus Bridge on March 7, 1965, and across the Jim Crow South in the historic struggle for racial equality. John Lewis then carried a mantle of moral authority into Congress.

On the front lines of the bloody campaign to end Jim Crow laws, he suffered many beatings, a fractured skull and jailing. Mr. Lewis was a valiant stalwart of the civil rights movement and a speaker at the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom in 1963.
movement. He was among the original 13 Freedom Riders, the Black and white activists who challenged segregated interstate travel in the South in 1961. He was a founder and early leader of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee, which coordinated lunch-counter sit-ins. He helped organize the March on Washington, where Dr. King was the main speaker, on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial.

Mr. Lewis led demonstrations against racially segregated restrooms, hotels, restaurants, public parks and swimming pools, and he rose up against other indignities of secondclass citizenship. At nearly every turn he was beaten and tormented by white mobs and law enforcement.

In the House of Representatives, Mr. Lewis was known for his relentless pursuit of justice, he was called "the conscience of the Congress" by his colleagues. In 2011, President Obama awarded Mr. Lewis the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the nation's highest civilian honor. John Lewis died July 17, 2020.

## From the Pastoral Staff

In this week's Gospel Matthew continues the Sermon on the Mount with a three part instruction by Jesus on the Way of Life in the kingdom of heaven. Today's reading is part one and deals with the Law. Part two deals with worship and religious practice and contains the Lord's Prayer. Part three deals with trusting God and deeds of loving service to our neighbor.
When Matthew speaks of "the Law and the prophets" he means the whole Scripture. When the Messiah brings the fullness of the kingdom none of scripture will be done away with. Instead it will be fulfilled. Matthew's Jesus does not overturn the Law of Moses, nor does he set his followers free from the Law. He requires his followers to go beyond the Law by doing more than the Law requires.
"The Law condemned murder. Jesus condemns anger. The

Law condemned adultery. Jesus condemns even lustful looks. As Jewish Christians who had always been faithful to the Law Matthew's community need a way to understand the difference Jesus and the kingdom he brings have made" (Sunday Connection, Loyola Press). They affirmed that God had always been at
 work in history through "the Law and the prophets." But God's work goes beyond that to be embodied by the Messiah who reveals the definitive will of God. The written scriptures and their interpretation in tradition are surpassed by Jesus whose life and teaching are the definitive revelation of the will of God.
